

Re: Cleveland Heights Municipal Court's Annual Report for 1997

In this, my 1997 annual report, I would like to bring the following matters to your attention.

This year has seen a stabilization in the number of traffic tickets handled by this court. There were 24,996 traffic filings in 1997 as compared to 16,655 in 1995 and 34,346 in 1996. The court continues to improve its collection procedures in an effort to minimize the number of defendants who default on fine payments. We have found that the issuance of license forfeitures for failure to pay is a very effective means by which to garner compliance from those who would otherwise ignore that responsibility. Accordingly, the court increased the number of license forfeitures it issued from 990 in 1996 to 1,650 in 1997. As a result of our license forfeiture program alone, 785 individuals who had failed to pay imposed fines honored their obligations this year.

The court's conscientious pursuit of fines that have been levied assists it in keeping court costs down. Once again, in 1997, this court was not required to raise its costs. Despite the fact that we have not raised costs the court's income continues to exceed its budget. It appears that we have successfully reversed the trend noted at the beginning of my tenure (see Comments accompanying this court's 1994 and 1995 financial reports) in which it appeared that costs would soon outstrip revenue.

While it is appropriate to concentrate on the financial aspects of the court's operation in this annual report, the efficacious and conscientious administration of justice is, of course, my primary purpose. I believe that no institution can rest on its laurels and that improvement is always possible and necessary. To that end, the court has made the following improvements in 1997: (1) The court has installed a system by which attorneys may search case dockets by modem; (2) Deputy bailiffs have been provided with peace officer training; (3) Housing court procedures have been modified by the implementation of a one year probation term restriction in an effort to reduce the number of cases that remain on the court's docket for an extended period of time; (4) The court has begun to make "courtesy calls" to housing court defendants who are issued warrants for non-appearance in an effort to increase the appearance rate while eliminating any undue embarrassment. This method appears to have cut the non-appearance rate almost in half.

As always, this court will continually review its procedures and work diligently to better all aspects of its operations every year.

These statistics are compiled from monthly reports submitted to the Supreme Court of Ohio under Superintendence Rule 12. Multiple charges filed against an individual as the result of the same act or series of acts are only counted as ONE CASE. Reactivated cases are those brought back onto the current docket when the Court regains jurisdiction over a defendant such as an arrest on a warrant or license forfeiture. The civil division of the court does not have reactivated cases. Individual criminal and traffic CHARGES appear elsewhere in this report.

These figures and those on the preceeding page represent the number of criminal complaints and the number of traffic tickets plus parking complaints actually filed with the court during the year 1996. The number of cases filed are on the Supreme Court Report Chart starting this section. The Rules of Superintendence for Municipal and County Courts provide that multiple offenses arising from the same incident by the same defendant be given only one case number and counted only as one case for the purpose of the monthly reports to the Supreme Court of Ohio. This is the basis for the difference between the number of CASES and CHARGES. There are always more charges than cases under this method.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

'There were 1,646 garnishments filed on civil and small claims actions.

The Landlord Tenant Division received eight (8) new cases and 7 were disposed of in 1997.

No Trusteeship cases were filed in 1997.

Judge Toler performed 12 weddings during the year.

There were 11 jury trials during 1997.

The criminal division issued 1,675 license forfeitures on persons who did not appear for court or did not pay their fine and costs. Approximately 500 persons took care of their forfeitures before the suspension dates became effective and 285 reinstatements were sent to the BMV for those who took care of their forfeitures after the suspension date.

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles returned \$1,975.00 to the City which was collected from DUI reinstatement fees collected by the BMV. This money was deposited in the DUI Indigent Fund as per State Statute. The State of Ohio returned \$3,071.00 to the City to cover the State per diem paid to acting judges, and \$977.00 was returned to the City for miscellaneous refunds.
