

Re: Cleveland Heights Municipal Court's Annual Report for 2002

Court proceedings have important value to all citizens and the Cleveland Heights Municipal Court will continue to place a premium on the efficient delivery of quality services. I am proud and very excited to report on the many positive and very innovative changes the court has made. In this, the Court's 2002 annual report, I would like to bring to your attention the following matters:

In 1999, the Court processed approximately 31,000 traffic offenses. In 2000, that number dropped to 21,000. In 2001, that number dropped even further to 15,753. In 2002, the number of traffic offenses handled by this court increased significantly to 22,102. This year the court remitted over \$1,643,000 to the City of Cleveland Heights while maintaining its adopted operating budget at \$980,130.

During the year 2002, significant changes have taken place within the court. One of the two magistrate positions has been eliminated resulting in the more efficient operation of the court, notwithstanding the substantial increases in the number of cases being handled by the Court. Other efficiencies such as the scheduling of mandatory final pre-trial conferences three days prior to jury trials have been implemented. This has resulted in the resolution of many criminal cases without Cleveland Heights jurors being inconvenienced by coming to court only to have cases settled on the day of trial.

In addition, new security measures have been implemented in Cleveland Heights Municipal Court. A metal detection scanner, purchased through a grant supplied by the Ohio Supreme Court, was placed into operation during all normal court hours and is manned by uniformed security personnel. A comprehensive courtroom security effort has been implemented that not only improves security in the courtroom and adjacent areas, but updates the emergency and disaster recovery plans. Additionally, in March 2002, we outfitted each of the two courtrooms with state of the art digital recording of all court proceedings. The digital recording provides clearer reception and faster retrieval of information and has eliminated the storage of bulky cassette tapes. New microphones were also placed in each of the courtrooms. Throughout this period of change, Cleveland Heights Municipal Court and the Clerk's office continued to process cases and provide service at a very high level of efficiency and courtesy.

While this court takes its fiscal responsibility to the City of Cleveland Heights quite seriously, the fair and efficient administration of justice, is, of course, this court's primary concern and ultimate goal. The court has continued to review and revise its housing court procedures in an effort to accomplish prompt and complete compliance with the housing code by housing defendants.

In the year 2003, the Cleveland Heights Municipal Court will develop and implement a comprehensive operations manual and will otherwise continue in its efforts to improve.

The figures above and those on the following page represent the number of criminal charges and the number of traffic charges plus parking complaints actually filed with the court during the year 2002. The number of cases filed are on the Supreme Court Report Chart starting this section. The Rules of Superintendence for Municipal and County Courts provide that multiple offenses arising from the same incident by the same defendant be given only one case number and counted only as one case for the purpose of the monthly reports to the Supreme Court of Ohio. This is the basis for the difference between the number of CASES and CHARGES. There are always more charges than cases under this method.

#### **MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS FOR 2002**

There were \_263 garnishments filed on civil and small claims actions. This number is lower than previous years due to the new continuing garnishment law.

The Landlord Tenant Division received 9 new cases and 8 were completed.

No Trusteeship cases were filed in 2002

Judge Buchanan performed 52 weddings during the year.

There were only 2 jury trials that actually went forward during 2002.

The criminal division again issued license forfeitures and registration blocks on persons who did not appear for court or did not pay their fine and costs. There were 1,121.00 reinstatements sent to the B.M.V. for those who took care of their forfeitures after the suspension date.

The Court and police department automated ticket project resulted in 1,624 traffic tickets (encompassing 2,247 charges) being processed in this manner. This ticket program is installed in six police cars.




# 2002 Criminal and Traffic Distribution of Funds
